EARTH DAY CREATIVITY

Make a homemade bird feeder!

Nurture your natural environment by creating a bird feeder for your winged neighbors. Simply fill empty milk cartons or plastic water bottles with bird seed. Watching feathered friends flock to the yard is bound to make your little ones smile with excitement (you, too!).

Assemble an inspired charcuterie board

If a culinary celebration is more your thing, jump on the charcuterie board trend and use your imagination to honor Mother Earth. Design a plant-forward board with fruits, vegetables, nuts, hummus, crackers, and dairy-free cheese. Paint flower pots and plant seeds

Want to get your kid's creative juices flowing?
Paint one of their hands blue and stamp it on a plain flower pot. Take a paint brush and add some green markings on the handprint until it resembles the Earth. Or skip the blue paint altogether and use their fingerprints to form flower petals or ladybugs. Once it's dry, fill it with soil and seeds to turn this craft project into a science experiment.

Make art out of recyclables

Turn trash into treasures by using materials from the recycling bin to create Earth Day masterpieces. Try making a picture of a tree out of egg cartons by cutting and painting the individual egg cups green and gluing them onto a canvas. Just add a brown trunk and any finishing touches.

HOW DO YOU KNOW WHAT COLORS GO TOGETHER?

COLORS THAT ARE OPPOSITE EACH OTHER ON THE COLOR WHEEL, LIKE RED AND GREEN OR BLUE AND ORANGE, OFTEN COMPLEMENT EACH OTHER WELL. THESE COMBINATIONS ARE CALLED COMPLEMENTARY COLORS.

Have you ever tried to make Earth Day Cookies?

Below is the recipe! Try it with your parents now and thank me later!

- In a large bowl, stir together softened butter and sugar until creamy and well-combined. Stir in vanilla, applesauce, and milk.
- In a separate smaller bowl, stir together flour, baking powder, and salt. Add the dry mix to the wet mixture, and stir until combined. If dough seems dry, add 1 teaspoon of additional milk at a time.
- After mixing your cookie dough, divide the batter into two
 equal amounts (this doesn't have to be perfect). Add green
 food coloring to one bowl, and blue coloring to the other. Stir
 each batch until color is evenly mixed in.
- Roll together a little dough from each bowl to make a blue and green marbled dough ball. Each ball should be about 1 1/2 to 2 Tablespoons.
- Place onto cookie sheet spaced 2 inches apart, and bake for 10-12 minutes. Bake time will depend on the size of your cookies.
- You'll want to remove cookies before they start to brown they may look slightly puffy, but they will set on the pan once out of the oven.
- Allow cookies to cool on the pan for 3-5 minutes before carefully transferring to a wire cooling rack. If desired, drizzle with icing once fully cooled.







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
